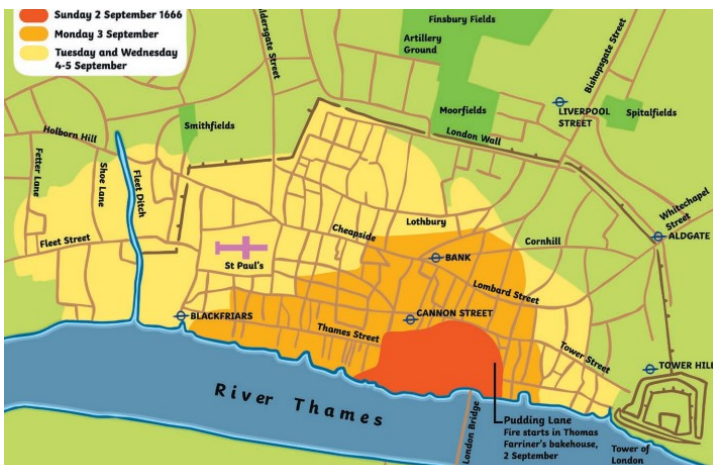


## Key Events of the Fire of London

<b>When and where?</b>	Sunday 2nd September 1666, Thomas Farriner's bakery, Pudding Lane, London
<b>Why did the fire start?</b>	The fires used for baking were not put out properly.
<b>Why did the fire spread so quickly?</b>	Houses made of wood and straw, Houses were close together, It had been a dry summer, There was a strong wind,
<b>How was the fire put out?</b>	Leather buckets, Water squirts, Houses pulled down,
<b>When did it end?</b>	Thursday 6th September, The wind had died down.





## Key Vocabulary

<b>bakery</b>	A place that makes bread and cakes
<b>St Paul's Cathedral</b>	A very large church in London. A new one was built after the fire by Christopher Wren
<b>diary</b>	A book that people write in about their day
<b>firebreak</b>	A gap that stops fire spreading to nearby buildings

## Famous stories in our Town of Wellingborough

<b>Hannah Spark</b> 1678 – 1785	
Where she lived	Pebble lane
<b>She saved All Hallows Church in the town centre in 1738</b>	
Silver street	The fire started in the house of Thomas Curtis, a cloth dyer.
<b>firebreak</b>	Made in the cornfields behind Cannon Street.
How much damage?	200 houses, 800 outhouses. 500-800 people homeless.
